I don't believe that the older we get the more we necessarily have figured out. That can often be a euphemism for being entrenched in our comfort zones or even our past pain. Keep your eyes open but also embrace the "Yes, and...!" And scene!

## Janis Thomsen, told to Cynthia Carangelo

I was born in Batavia, New York in 1931. Batavia is located in western New York, south of Rochester. I had three sisters. We had a very nice relationship between all of us. My mother was a schoolteacher and then became a housewife. Later on, she became a painter and did artwork. My father was a textbook salesman. This was a positive for our family, because during the war we were able to afford and have a car.

I went to college at Cornell University. It sounds great, but really, it was no better than any state school. I went to college to study home economics, but I should have gone for something "meatier." During my time at Cornell, I was taking horseback riding lessons. Through my horseback riding teacher, I got the opportunity to go abroad to Denmark! I had always wanted to go abroad, but my mother was furious!

In Denmark, I found a job working in a kitchen. There, I met my husband, who was a very educated man. I got a job delivering newspapers when we were short on money. We couldn't afford a car in Denmark—to own one, you had to be very rich! I rode my bike everywhere. Between that and my newspaper delivery job, I got very familiar with the Danish country and culture. I even learned to speak and write in Danish.

We ended up moving back to the United States because my husband was interested in moving there. However, we still kept our connections in Denmark and traveled back and forth to visit. We lived in Harrisburg, Pennsylvania, then up close to Buffalo, then to Rochester, where my husband found a job as head engineer.

Our first child was born in Denmark. Our older son is still living there and is married to a Danish woman. My daughter lives close by. She is my best friend and advocate.

Denmark is a country that really pushes education. When we moved back to the United States, I became a substitute teacher—I think I learned more than the kids did! I plan to continue to educate myself as long as I can. I am very political and I read a lot.



Because I married a man who was doing well, I was fortunate enough to be able to retire at Woodland Pond. I moved to Woodland Pond early—I was maybe the 60<sup>th</sup> person to move in? While here, I have continued to take experiences and education as often as possible. I think that not only the experiences that I have had,

but also living at Woodland Pond have made me quite accepting of people and accepting of opportunities that have come my way. There's nothing special about me—I just took the opportunities that were presented to me. I am very fortunate!




## From the ROVE Committee


