WP's Summer Olympics In Full Swing!

For the first two weeks of this month we will be enjoying the Summer Olympics in Paris, France while also challenging ourselves to some Olympic fun here at home! We're offering competitive events in various venues throughout the campus and celebrating French culture through crafts, films, culinary experiences, and more! Whether you're an active participant in our Games or a cheerleader on the sidelines, we hope the Olympic spirit catches you!

Here's just a sample of some of the campus-wide Olympic events planned — you can see the full schedule at the Olympics display table across from the Reservation Station and on posted fliers in the Mail Room and on Connected Living:



Thursday, Aug. 1 and Friday Aug. 2 at 1 p.m. in the PAC - Ping Pong Tournament, with the first round on Thursday and the final round on Friday. The contestants are gearing up for the challenge, so come to the PAC to cheer them on!

On Friday, Aug 2 at 2:30 p.m. in the IL Courtyard we'll have an Olympic Seed-Spitting Contest! Staff and residents are welcome to compete to demonstrate their skill. We'll be celebrating National Watermelon Day, too! That evening at 7 p.m. in the PAC the Classic Movie Night Olympic feature will be the 1981 film *Chariots of Fire*, with its story theme based on events at the 1924 Olympics.



Monday, Aug. 5 at 1 p.m. in the IL Courtyard you can join Matt for Olympic Lawn Games and at 7 p.m. in the PAC will be a film presentation: *Forever France* — discover unexpected contemporary and historical connections between France and the United States.

On Tuesday, Aug. 6 at 1 p.m. the focus moves to the pool where Matt will oversee some easy, fun relays. Sign up with Matt to save your spot for this competition!

Health Center events in the Great Room will include a campus-wide Rummi-Kub Tournament on Thursday, Aug. 1 at 2 p.m., an Olympic Obstacle Course race on Tuesday, Aug. 6 at 2 p.m., and a French cooking demonstration on Friday, Aug. 9 at 2:15 p.m.

Our Closing Ceremony celebration will be **Saturday**, **Aug. 10 at 2:30 p.m.** in the Health Center's Great Room, featuring live music by *Grampa Joe's Washboard Band*, and we'll cap off the WP Games on **Sunday**, **August 11** with an Olympic-themed brunch during the normal **12 p.m. and 12:45 p.m. seatings**.

Sustainability Committee News

How can WP residents increase our Ecological Literacy? What can we learn from SUNY NP's Innovative Sustainability Program?

To respond, Lisa Mitten, SUNY Campus Sustainability Coordinator, will be SusComm's guest speaker on Tuesday, Aug. 20 at 2 p.m. in the PAC.

Right in our backyard, SUNY New Paltz is a model of sustainability and a center of environmental learning and action. To achieve a goal of *global* sustainability, the College ensures that all students achieve a basic level of *ecological literacy*. Back in 2003, an interdisciplinary Environmental Geochemical Science major was added to SUNY curricula, followed in 2006 by an Environmental Studies minor. (Could we have such 'courses' at WP? Let's search again for a Sustainability Coordinator!)

In May 2013, Lisa Mitten MPP, MS-Ed. became the college's first Campus Sustainability Coordinator. She oversees the assessment and implementation of SUNY's various environmental action plans.

For example, the Energy Action Plan states: "The most cost effective way to conserve energy is not to use it in the first place." Such conservation includes lighting controls and upgrades; night setbacks; purchasing efficient equipment and installing a biomass boiler.

The Solid Waste and Purchasing Action Plan includes increasing food and landscape waste composting and recycling; increasing sustainable food; writing into the next food service contract sustainable food recommendations and goals.

We at Woodland Pond would like to learn from Lisa which, and how, some of the College's goals and action plans are scaleable to WP. Attend her talk, increase your ecological literacy, and partake in the discussion.



You are more likely to abandon an exercise program or activity if it does not fit into your lifestyle. When choosing an activity or exercise program, try to think about some of these things:


- Do you like to do things on your own or with a group?



Income Tax Education for WP Residents

New residents of Woodland Pond who will have paid an Entry Fee and/or a Lifecare Fee in 2024 should be aware of important income tax information. This may affect their financial decisions in 2024, as well as their income tax return filed in 2025.

Bill Tuel, an IRS-certified volunteer tax preparer (and Woodland Pond resident), will give an educational talk about income taxes at Woodland Pond, on **Wednesday**, **Aug. 7**, **at 1 p.m.** in the PAC. The talk will include explaining the deduction of portions of the Entry Fee and the Lifecare Fee as itemized medical expenses on your Income Tax return, and how these may affect your financial decisions in 2024.

New residents are strongly encouraged to attend, but all residents are welcome. This is NOT a Woodland Pond sponsored meeting. Woodland Pond management does NOT provide tax advice. This presentation is intended to allow residents to knowledgeably discuss their specific tax situation with their tax preparer and financial advisor. Residents are encouraged to provide this information to their preparer before their return is prepared.

Steve & Robbin Goodman ~ Cottage 137


