1) Make your own gift. Charlie, Vivian, Yakov and Lea show handmade toys created from common objects (toothpicks, corks, ribbon, etc).





2) Offer your time and energy. Marilyn, Dawn, and Bill hold gift certificates that promise to take the receiver out to dinner, take on a hike, babysit, and shovel winter snow off the driveway.

3) RE-gift with hand made wrap. For every gift you give, re-home something in your house (not into garbage). Go to WP free store. Wrap it in your own handmade gift wrap: June, Michelle, Fran and Eileen hold potatoes cut into



stencils that design newspaper "wrapping" paper.

The beautiful thing about our health is that we can improve it at any time, and in many ways. Health is a process, something we prioritize every day. We should remember that there is no such thing as perfect health and that it takes a dynamic process to develop a lifestyle that supports our overall health and well-being. When thinking about health, we should begin focusing on the body and how it communicates.

The human body has a large network of interconnected systems such as the immune system, nervous system, and endocrine system, which create a complex biological adaptive system. This system requires specific baseline inputs to achieve a positive state of health. Ultimately, for our network of systems to function properly, we need to focus on our environment and inputs. If they are in an adequate state, our health will have a positive output. Environment and inputs can be diet, sleep, hydration, exercise, breathing, stress management, and relationships. Who is an ally? We are the relatives, friends, acquaintances, and anyone else who is showing support of LGBTQIA+ people. By attending the








WP Benefit Fund Update

BRAIN HEALTH GROUP formerly the A-Team

Our goal this year was to benefit residents by providing informational programs and giving support to families of people dealing with Dementia, Alzheimer and Parkinson's diseases. We did it and noted there are changes in awareness and treatments but there are still no cures for these debilitating diseases. Latest numbers indicate 1 in 3 seniors dies with Alzheimer's or another dementia.



Another Woodland Pond BHG Goal was to support the efforts of the Alzheimer's Association. The Oct 19th 2024 Alzheimer's Association Dutchess/Ulster Walk over the Hudson goal was \$245,000. They collected \$233,316.

Thank you, Woodland Pond residents and staff. You attended our four programs and you contributed to the Alzheimer's Association, raising \$854 at our ice cream socials, \$787 at our car wash and by families and friends who donated cash and checks totaling \$4,733. It's less than half of what we collected and contributed in 2023, but you asked us to let up on our fund raising efforts. We held No dinners, No raffles and had No sweatshirt sales this year. However, residents, staff and families still donated, walked and helped show that Woodland Pond is a Community in Support of the Alzheimer's Association.

In 2025 The Brain Health Group is back to calling itself a TEAM and we need new members. We want your input and help. Thanks again.
