Are you a "Green Dot"-ter? Save a tree!

WP's Sustainability Committee sponsors two important paper saving programs: Green Dot and GOOSe paper. Participate and Save A Tree!

Green Dots - Agree to a Green Dot in your mail room cubby to receive <u>via email only</u> for routine communications (i.e. weekly Chanticleer, parking notices, personnel changes). (Monthly Financial statement is a separate ask.) <u>Paper</u> remains for the monthly *Woodland Life* newsletter and important press releases. *See Lindsey if you have questions about the Green Dot Survey.*

GOOSe paper stands for Good On One SidE. Donate and freely take uncreased uncrumpled pages with writing only on one side in Cart room box. (Check: no confidential info on used side!)

Did You Know? A standard pine tree with 45 ft of usable trunk, diameter of eight inches, produces and estimated 10,000 sheets of paper? A standard 500-sheet ream of office paper uses about 6% of a tree.

Did You Know? One tree produces about 100 pounds of toilet paper. An average consumer uses about 15 pounds per year. Thus, globally, toilet paper alone could consume 27,000 trees *every* day.

Alternative Plant Based Paper Products - Bamboo is a superstar sustainable alternative to wood or plastic: no petrochemicals or artificial pesticides and can grow to 3.5 feet per day! (An average oak tree grows about 12 inches annually) Bamboo recaptures Co2 faster and puts out more oxygen than trees. Check out recycled bamboo products from companies called "Who Gives a Crap" and "Seek Bamboo."




