Creativity and Illness

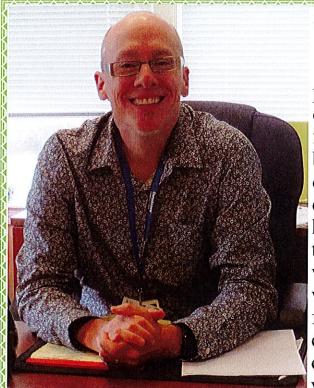

The P.I.G.L.E.T.S. are Coming!

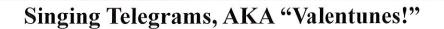

After a long trip as a tourist, he hopped on the cheapest ship back to New York. Gillian was attending Exeter University in Devon, England when she received a scholarship from John D. Rockefeller to study at William and Mary in Williamsburg, Brooklyn. So naturally, Gillian hopped on the cheapest ship to New York. In 1958, on the T.S.S. New York, Gillian and David met and their love story began. The voy-

age was supposed to last just five days but, due to a hurricane, the trip lasted ten days.

Gillian and David laughed together while recalling the story of the hurricane. "The rest of the ship was quite sick but us college kids— there must have been eight of us—were having the time of our lives on the deck!" Gillian recounted. David said "We were dancing in the rain, ducking and running under the waves that crashed over the edges of the ship."

Though they resided on different decks and ate in different dining rooms, they both said they spent the next couple of days on the ship looking for each other and spending the afternoons getting acquainted. They ended up arriving in New York on Labor Day and David accompanied her to customs.

Though they went to different colleges they wrote each other letters every moment they could. During a holiday Gillian received a letter from David asking her to hop on the first bus she could to Washington. He had decided he wanted to hitch-hike to Washington and wanted her to meet him there. Gillian immediately hopped on the bus, using the last of her money to do so. Once the bus neared Washington, she realized that she wouldn't know which terminal he was waiting in. After fearing she would have to resort to the British Embassy since it was late and she had no money, someone mentioned there was another terminal with a bar inside. So Gillian made her way to the second terminal and there was David dutifully waiting for her while enjoying a drink.

Once they finished university, Gillian moved to Poughkeepsie and worked at Howard Johnson as a waitress to earn her fare back to England. That summer David proposed to her at a beautiful wooded spot in the Hudson Valley. Gillian returned to England, and soon after Gillian and David got married in England.
