
Kaleidoscope of the Arts is not just for residents to attend — please invite your family and friends in the wider community to come enjoy the day with you!

Book Review

The Guns of August by Barbara Tuchman

Woodland Pond Library is focusing on world history this month. Barbara Tuchman, in this Pulitzer Prizewinning book, takes a global perspective as she recreates the conflict and carnage of World War I. European and world history was forever changed by this war.

An eminent and renowned historian, Tuchman recounts the political events, power intrigues, and terrible diplomacy that caused the war. She describes military and royal history with a compelling narrative. She concludes that the results of the war had destroyed the beliefs of the times before 1914 and could never be restored. World War I decided the course of world history for the next hundred years!


