#### Sustainability Committee News Reduce Your Unwanted Mail

You can help save our trees. The world's forests are disappearing at an alarming rate. An estimated 200 million trees are cut down daily to make paper: i.e. a tree is cut down every 2.5 seconds. About 1.4 billion trees end up in landfills each year, resulting from product packaging and other paper waste. And, the pulp and paper industry accounts for about 5 percent of the world's emissions and uses about 4 percent of the world's energy. E.g. Using paper towels accounts for about 3000 metric tons of waste daily! (You can reduce that amount by using organic bamboo washcloths to dry your hands. Also try bamboo toilet paper).

Starting in October collect in a bag all such mail, and bring it to SusComm.'s bi-monthly educational meeting on Tuesday, Oct. 15 at 2 p.m. in the PAC. We'll help you take steps to stop this unwanted pollution/ nuisance.

Also, remember to attend SusComm's general Meeting on Wednesday, Oct. 23 at 2 p.m. in the Classroom.




